

2. What are some assumptions of the demographic transition model? (p. 366)

3. **Examine Figure 11-13 on p. 366.** Read this model until you understand it. You can reproduce it below if you wish, although it probably isn't necessary. There are many important concepts "hidden" in the chart. Be familiar with the reasons for each stage occurring. Ask why the example countries are placed where they are. Test your "reading" with these questions.

- What kind of societies would fit into Stage 1?
- Using inference from the model, compare Kenya with Austria.
- What is the relationship between historical time and population growth?
